Flights to Kamchatka

Additional travel within Russia

Red Star Travel (travel@travel2russia.com or (206) 522-5995) can arrange travel and tours of Moscow, St. Petersburg, Lake Baikal or anywhere else in Russia. Many people today are taking extra time seeing the sights of Russia. Moscow is an ideal stopover. We recommend spending a few extra nights in Moscow on the return trip. Lots of our guests have gone on these tours. Red Star can arrange for hotels, tours, private tour guides, trains, just about anything in Russia.

Visa Invitations and Visa Processing

1. Once we receive your deposit for your trip to Kamchatka we will provide you with all the information needed to get your Russian Visa. 2. Red Star Travel does all our visa processing. Red Star travel they will provide your visa invitation for free, normally a \$50 fee. 3. Red Star Travel is located in Seattle and they hand carry your passport, visa application, and fees to the Russian Embassy. This speeds up the process of getting this paperwork finished. Fees for processing your Russian Visa approximately \$250 are paid directly to Red Star Travel and they pay the Russian Embassy.

Trip Insurance

Ouzel Expeditions is not in the insurance business. We require trip insurance! [Travel Guard](#) is one company 1-800-826-4919. Travel Guard's insurance can include medical insurance good in Russia, trip cancellation insurance and emergency medical transportation in case of a medical emergency. Sign up for trip insurance when you book your trip. The coverage is more extensive if you purchase your insurance within 14 days of your initial deposit. Red Star Travel sells Travel Guard's trip insurance. Get your flight reservations, trip insurance, any side trips in Russia and Russian Visa taken care of, all at one place.

Communications

American cell phones with International service work in Kamchatka. Beware, they have very high rates. We have taken satellite phones to Kamchatka for years. We have a satellite phone on each trip. It's for emergency use only. If your family needs to contact you, please have them call 1-800-825-8196, Ouzel's toll free number in Alaska. They can leave their message and our office staff will contact us on our satellite phone. Many guests rent satellite phones. It is not a problem to bring a satellite phone to Russia. We can direct you to different satellite phone rental companies in Anchorage. <http://www.anchoragesatellitephones.com/>

We recommend getting your motel reservations as soon as possible. The motels get booked up in the summer. Here are some suggestions: These hotels offer free shuttle service to and from the airport. Some have breakfast included. When you make your motel reservations, be sure to ask them about your arrival time and their 6 p.m. hold policy.

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Ouzel's General Information for all our Fly Fishers

Bears: We see bears. Bears normally run quickly and are hard to get good pictures of. Make plenty of noise while on the river. Do not bring bear mace.

Bugs: You need insect repellent. There are many types available. Deet is the main ingredient in most insect repellents and works well against mosquitoes. You don't have to spray the insect repellent on yourself; just put it on your shirt and hat. Aerosol or spray insect repellent is nice, that way you don't have to get it on your hands. It's pretty hard on fishing line and plastic.

Cash: You should have extra cash in case of an emergency. Don't bring traveler's checks, they require going to bank and the lines there can be very long. Travel with cash and bring only new clean, non-damaged \$100 and \$20 bills. Russian Banks and stores only accept clean, new bills. Some places accept credit cards these days. There are bank card machines you can get Rubles from.

Credit cards: We accept MasterCard or Visa. While traveling in Russia more places are taking credit cards.

Fishing License: Licenses cost \$160 for a week.

Fly Boxes: People have been using small plastic boxes for their fishing tackle. Some use fly vests to put their flies in.

Gratuities: Normally they range from 10 to 15% of your trip's price.

Interpreters: A highly trained Russian interpreter accompanies each Ouzel group.

Meals & Lodging: Meals in **town** and lodging in hotels will cost you approximately \$210 per night if needed and are **not** included in the trips package price. You pay for them in Kamchatka. While on the river Ouzel Expeditions has expert Russian cooks. Our traditional Russian meals are plentiful and delicious!

Nets: A net for landing and releasing fish is handy. Make sure its deep enough to fit a big size bow in it. A small salmon net is better for the Rainbows on our trips. <http://www.brodin.com/Coho.html>

Plastic bags: Pack a few zip lock and large garbage bags. Put your dirty or wet clothes in them. They're nice for wet wading boots and waders too. A zip lock bag can become a semi-waterproof camera bag.

Polarized sunglasses are a must, the lighter are better for overcast days. A spare pair is recommended.

Tents, Sleeping Bags: Ouzel Expeditions Provides sleeping tents. The tents are light, highly wind and water-resistant. We do provide thermarest air mattresses or cots. We **DO NOT** provide sleeping bags or a pillow so be sure to bring your own.

Transportation in Russia: Once you're in Petropavlovsk travel is included in Ouzel's trip price. We provide transportation to and from the heli ports, hotels and short tours. You can use a taxi if you want to go off on your own.

Travel Documents: **Make 2 photocopies your Passport and Visa.** Once you get your Russian visa please mail or email a copy of it to us at Ouzel. We need it for your Russian fishing license and to get your Immigration papers into Kamchatka done for you. The Immigration paperwork is required since Kamchatka is considered a military outpost like community. In case you lose your passport it's nice to have a copy. Pack your photocopy of your passport and visa separately from your passport and tickets. Put it somewhere else in your gear or trade with a friend.

Upon arrival in Kamchatka you will have to fill out a Russian Declaration with passport number, how much cash and a list of valuable items you have with you. **Keep it folded inside your passport.** You'll need this Declaration if you go to a bank. You'll need your Declaration when you depart Russia. Plus, you'll have to fill out a new Declaration when you depart Russia.

Water Filters: We recommend you bring a personal water filter. The inexpensive personal charcoal water filters are all you need. Or you should bring a water bottle and just fill it with our large water purifier.

Waterproof Bags: We loan you a waterproof bag in Kamchatka for your clothes and sleeping bag. Some people want to have their own waterproof bag ahead of time. This way you can pack in it before arriving in Kamchatka. Just call Jack's Plastic Welding [1] 800-742-1904. Ask for the Large Round Bottom Outfitter Bag. Weather: The weather in Kamchatka is temperate and coastal. It gets a lot of snow in winter and spring runoff is high and muddy in June. It's weather is a lot like that in the Rockies; July and August temperatures can be from the 50's to the high 90's, cool nights, hot days. It's warmer and a little rainy like Alaska. September is in the 70's but can frost.

Clothing Outer Layer: Waders: Gortex or breathable waders are the only way to go. There are many brands that work well. These breathable waders are waterproof, yet allow moisture to escape, even while under water, keeping you cool and dry. Breathable waders work very well all times of the year. They're extremely tough, very light and easy to pack. Your waders serve to resist or block the elements -- such as wind, rain, or snow. Get your waders a little big so you can put on extra clothes if it's cold.

Under Your Waders: The right mix of layers can prevent overheating and conversely, chilled muscles and even hypothermia. The key to staying comfortable is a well-regulated body temperature. Layers of clothing can be added or taken off. Don't wear cotton on the river. Whether you call it fleece, polypropylene, capilene, or polartec, this is the right stuff. **Tip: Bring thin polypropylene long underwear and thicker fleece pants.**

Base Layer: A thin polypropylene underwear base layer helps to regulate your body's microclimate by wicking moisture away from your skin.

Second Layer: The fleece pants can be the second layer in a continuation of the base layer in managing moisture, they provide more thermal insulation. You can just wear the fleece pants if it's not that cold.

Rain Jacket: Gortex or breathable raincoats are the way to go. Several are made just for fishing. These are shorter. Others are longer and are more multipurpose. Both work just fine. This is the only coat you need on the trip.

Under your Rain Jacket: You need several fleece or polypropylene shirts. You just vary which and how many layers to put on to be the right temperature.

You need a fleece jacket. They are available from a multitude of manufacturers, Patagonia, Cabelas, REI, Orvis, Northface, and Mountain Hardware. Some fleece jackets have a windproof barrier in them that makes them warmer. You don't have to have this windproof barrier in your fleece jacket. They stop the wind but not the rain.

Socks: Wool is still the best type of sock inside wading shoes. Smart wool socks are nice. There are many brands of socks that have elastic and wool mixed and don't bunch up.

Wading Shoes: Felt Soled Wading Shoes are the only way to go. You can use felt in Kamchatka. They help you walk on moss-covered rocks. Don't bring studded wading shoes. Our rafts are made of rubber and they are not good on our floors. It is not against the law to bring felt soled wading boots to Kamchatka. Please make sure to clean them with Clorox so that no bad bug life is transmitted into the streams in Kamchatka.

Packing your River Clothing: Here's a system that makes it easier to find things inside your waterproof bag: You can use plastic bags (like you get at the grocery store) to keep your like items together. Put socks in one bag, underwear in another, shirts in another etc. Then put all your plastic bags with you river clothes into a zippered gym bag approximately 2-1/2 ft x 16" or whatever size you need. This way you can drop your gym bag into the waterproof bag that will already contain your sleeping bag and thermarest pad. If all your clothes are loose in your waterproof bag it makes it very hard to find anything. This little system makes it a lot easier to find what you're looking for anytime you want a change of clothes or an extra layer.

We loan you a large waterproof bag when we get to Kamchatka. Or, you can bring your own waterproof bags. Things like wading shoes, waders, and fishing tackle do not need to go in the waterproof bag when you're on the river. Carry on cameras or whatever. Don't put fish hooks in your carry on luggage.

Yakutia Airlines' baggage limit is 2 pieces of check luggage totaling 75 lbs. and 1 carry on of 11 lbs. They may or may not charge extra for rods or count them as one piece. Four piece rods are the way to go. I put mine in my suitcase.

Tip: You don't want to take your town clothes on the river. Leave them behind just before we get on the helicopter. They will be stored for you while you are on the river. Pack your town clothes in

a small bag or just leave them in your suitcase. We do not take suitcases on the river. Anything you choose to leave behind will be safe with our people in Petropavlovsk.

This is a general list for Kamchatka. From September on you need a few more layers of fleece clothes. The experienced wilderness traveler comes prepared for the worst but doesn't take extra things. Clothing wise; you need what is on this list.

Flies for fishing Kamchatka

Flies: We stock the flies on our list. We can pick your flies for you or, you can choose which flies you want. Just call us and we can talk it over and put it on your credit card. Please do this at least 30 days ahead of your trip.

Our fly list is very complete. You don't need all the flies on this list. Many of these popular flies look alike or represent the same thing.

If you tie your own flies and want some of our patterns, tell us. We can let you know the cost and mail you some. Fly Patterns of Alaska by the Alaska Fly Fishers: Frank Amato Publications, PO. Box 82112, Portland Oregon 97282. (503) 653-8108, is probably the best single book on tying flies for Alaska. These Alaska patterns work very well in Kamchatka.

Rainbows feed on **mice** all summer long. Large Deer or Elk hair mice work well. Be sure they are tied on heavy hooks. The Rainbows hit them hard and bend light hooks straight. Our Ouzel Cork Mouse has been working very well. They don't sink or need dry fly dressing so they are easy to fish with. Kamchatka has the best mouse fishing.

Dry flies work very well in Kamchatka. Best sizes are generally 12 and 14. We've had lots of trips where we only use dry flies for the entire week from late July on. Bring lots of your favorites: Humpy, Adams, Black Gnats, Elk Hair Caddis, Madam X, Mice, Blue Dun, and even Pink Pollywogs work.

All summer long baby salmon smolt out-migrate to the sea. Sockeye smolt stay in the river for 2 years. Rainbows feast on them all summer long. Some of the smolt are up to 7 inches long! This is why the giant Dali Lamas work so well. The Crystal Zonker Grizzly is an excellent smolt pattern. Others are: Katmai Smolt, Coronation, Blue Smolt, leaches and green or black woolly buggers.

Large attractor patterns work best for **Salmon**: Purple Egg Sucking Leach, Babine Special, White Egg Sucking Leech, Pink Egg Sucking Leech, Hot Pink Sparkler, Single Egg Fly, Sockeye Orange and the Polar Shrimp. They will take just about anything that's big and flashy. Chums really seem to take just about anything but their personal favorite is the Fuchsia Bugger.

Silvers go for Purple, White or Black Egg Sucking Leeches. Sometimes Silvers take green or other bright colored flies like Lime Bunny Bugs or flies with lots of flashabou or crystal flash in them. Sockeye take sparsely dressed flies like a Sockeye Orange or a Coho fly.

Good King flies are: Alaskabous, King Killers or Fat Freddy's and Polar Shrimp. Basically, King flies are large and red and white with maribou, which moves pretty well underwater.

The **Egg Sucking Leach** is a most amazing fly, have a large number of these. For easy fishing, this is the King. They work on Char, Rainbows and all the Salmon. Purple seems to be the best all around color but they work well in black, green, white and pink too. It doesn't really copy anything, except maybe a smolt with an egg in its mouth.

The **Dali Lama** has proven itself to be a most excellent fly. Be sure to have several of these.

Ouzel Expeditions **Camps** include a large Kichen tent and tarp to cover more of your gear. We've been told our camps in he wilderness are the best in the world by experienced guests, many who have owned their own guide services. To see what they're like click:

Fly Rods and Fly Lines: We recommend you bring 2 fly rods in the 6 to 9 weight range. A 7 is your best choice for your smaller rod. A 5 can't deal with the salmon or large rainbows. Bring an 8 or 9 for your larger rod. An 8 weight seems to be the most popular choice. I have fished a 7 for many years now and it's plenty of rod for large Rainbows yet light enough to fish all day. You just have to watch it when you have a large salmon on. Generally you'll fish the whole week with the smaller rod. The larger rod is for sinking lines or salmon should you decide to go after them. You should bring 2 fly lines for this larger rod a floating and a sinking tip line. If you are going on the Kapushka River you won't need a sinking line. Bring the second line as a backup line in case you loose yours to an underwater object or a fish.

If you only want to bring 1 fly rod, the best all around choice is an 8 weight, 9 to 9 1/2 feet long. You can catch just about anything on this rod. Kings may or may not break an 8 weight but, it's good for all the other salmon and is still light enough to use for smaller fish. An 8 weight is not the best for catching King Salmon.

Size 7, 8 and 9-weight rods work well for Sockeye, Silver and Chum Salmon. These larger rods are over kill for smaller fish. 9 and 10 weight rods work well for Kings. Longer length rods seem to cast sinking tip lines better. A ten foot 10 weight is very good for kings, so is a spey rod for that matter.

More people are bringing lighter spey rods in the 6 and 7 range these days. These rods are sometimes called switch rods. They are pretty nice and can take a load off your arm.

Reels should match rods so they are balanced. Single action reels are best for Salmon as multiplier reels make it difficult to bring Salmon in. The mid arbor and large arbor reels are very popular these days.

Backing: Be sure to use heavier backing on your fly reel than your tippet material. When fishing for Kings use 50 lb. backing. When fishing for Kamchatka Rainbows on the rivers we fish use at least 30 lb. test backing behind your fly line. You will probably be using 20 test leader for fishing with mice. You don't want to lose your fly line!

Fly Lines: Almost all of our fishing is in shallow water using **floating lines**. Bring weight forward floating lines for both of your fly rods. This kind of line is usually designated with a WF for weight forward or WFF for weight forward floating. This line is thicker or larger around at the tip and thinner at the back end which makes it easier to cast. A clean line slips through the guides much easier and casts further too. You can always use a long leader with weighted flies to get down. This works well. You can bring a sinking tip line for this smaller rod but it's not necessary.

Here are Ouzel's suggestions for sinking tip lines. Use a Teeny sink tip 200 Grains for 7, 8 or 9 wts. Most of the rivers we float are shallow and we don't even use a sinking line on them.

Leaders and Tippet: Use tapered leaders for dry flies in lengths of 7 ½ to 10 feet. When fishing for Kings use 25 lb. test. Keep these tippets short, 3 to 4 feet long, tied directly on to the fly line with a nail not. The less knots the better.

Use straight tippet material for streamers, (Rio is very nice) for sinking flies in weights of 16 to 20 lbs test. Straight tippet material is fine for Mice too. They don't exactly roll over anyway. Bring spools of tippet material in the 14 to 20 lb. range. Remember, when you hook the big one, you don't want to have the leader break! The fish are not leader shy!

Please remember that these recommendations are merely that, recommendations. You are by no means required to purchase all of these flies. The suggested flies mentioned here is what we have found to work best for most fishing conditions.

These are average amounts of popular flies. Bring all your dries in all the sizes you have. Size and approximate color need to be matched sometimes. Amounts you bring will vary if you plan to exclusively fish dry flies or fish more for salmon ect. A number of the red & white flies are interchangeable and anything red works once the salmon come in. Smolt patterns work all summer long. **Don't forget your mice!**

CATCH AND RELEASE

Increasing numbers of anglers are fishing Kamchatka. We don't see others on our trips. The rivers we're fishing have been staying in excellent shape! Continuation of high quality sport fishing depends upon anglers catching and carefully releasing their fish. Here are some techniques that can help us keep Kamchatka's remarkable Rainbow Trout fishery vital.

Choosing Your Tackle

- Use strong line to bring your catch in quickly.
- Use hooks appropriate to the size of the fish.
- Use pliers to pinch barbs on hooks down.

Landing Your Catch

- Land your fish as carefully and quickly as possible.
- Avoid removing the fish from the water.
- Do not let fish flop about in shallow water, on the ground, or in the bottom of your boat.
- Use landing nets made with soft or knotless mesh.

Handling Your Catch

- Keep your fish in the water.
- Cradle large fish gently with both hands: one under its belly, one at the tail.
- Keep your fingers out of and away from the gills and eyes.
- Use wet hands or wet cloth gloves to handle the fish.
- Never squeeze the fish.
- Support your fish in the water while your partner takes your picture. Fish can not remain healthy out of water for longer than you can hold your breath.

Removing Your Hook

- Use long nose pliers to back the hook out.
- Remove the hook quickly, keeping the fish underwater.
- When the fish is hooked deeply, cut the line to release the fish.
- Use steel hooks that will rust out, avoid stainless steel hooks.

Reviving Your Catch

- Keep your catch in the water at all times. If you want to take a photograph, have the photographer get ready, then lift the fish barely out of the water and quickly return it to the water.
- Point your catch into a slow current, or gently move it back and forth until its gills are working properly and it maintains its balance. When the fish recovers and attempts to swim away, let it swim from your hands.
- Let the fish bite on your finger after getting the hook out. It will let go when it's ready to.

Large fish may take more time to revive. Especially the big Rainbows, many some of them are up to 12 years old according to our scientific studies.
